What is a Rural Generalist?

A Rural Generalist is a General Practitioner who has specific expertise in providing medical care for rural and remote or isolated communities. They understand and respond to the diverse needs of these rural communities by:

- applying a population approach
- providing safe primary, secondary and emergency care
- providing culturally engaging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' healthcare
- providing medical care in at least one advanced speciality.

Core Generalist Training (3 years) ●
